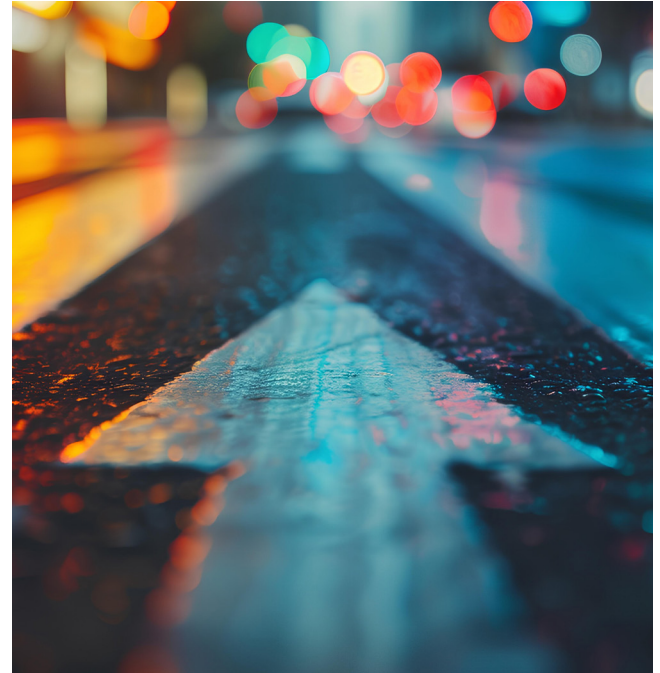

The Association of State and Territorial Dental Directors (ASTDD) is a national, nonprofit organization representing the leaders and staff of state and territorial oral health programs (S/TOHPs) within public health agencies. Since its founding in 1948, ASTDD has served as a trusted partner and resource, promoting effective public health strategies to prevent oral disease and improve oral health outcomes throughout the lifespan.

ASTDD plays a pivotal role in shaping national oral health policy, supporting states and territories in developing and implementing prevention-focused programs and policies. Through collaboration and shared learning, ASTDD builds capacity and strengthens the public oral health workforce by developing best practice approach reports, policy statements, white papers, and issue briefs.

ASTDD connects professionals across jurisdictions by hosting conferences and providing timely information to health officials, policymakers, and partners. Our primary members include state and territorial dental directors or their equivalents, with associate membership open to their staff, public agencies, voluntary organizations, tribal entities, and health professionals committed to advancing dental and overall health.



ASTDD COMMITTEES, COMMUNITIES OF PRACTICE, AND FOCUS AREAS

In 2025, ASTDD provided various resources and hours of technical assistance (TA) and training to state/territorial personnel and partners.

Over the course of the year, ASTDD's committees developed a diverse set of resources for our members and the broader dental public health community. Furthermore, our Communities of Practice (CoP) offered opportunities for individuals to engage with others who share similar concerns, challenges, and a passion for specific topics. These included:

The Basic Screening Survey (BSS) CoP focused on recruiting schools to participate in the BSS, increasing consent rates for children to be screened, disseminating data from the BSS, exploring alternate methods of collecting oral health status data, and contracting with screeners.

The Communications CoP produced two areas of content in 2025: (1) language that states may want to avoid using in documents, reports, and on their websites, and (2) "A New Direction for State Oral Health Programs," with resources and tools for demonstrating an oral health program's value.

The Fluoridation CoP held interactive learning sessions on these topics: messaging about community water fluoridation, reporting, the Water Fluoridation Reporting System, oral health data dashboards, and ASTDD resources and technical assistance.

ASTDD complemented the work of this CoP by monitoring potential fluoridation activities with a

subscription to a data-mining service and a daily Google Alert on relevant media coverage. When an alert that might warrant attention arrives, each state oral health program lead and known fluoridation contact receives an email. This early-warning system often is a state's first notice about a planned public meeting on CWF and allows it to engage partners, prepare, and attend. In 2025, eight states requested TA from ASTDD related to community water fluoridation. On an intermittent basis, ASTDD also provides compilations of resources for fluoridation-related topics via member listservs.

The Medical/Dental Integration CoP helped ASTDD facilitate information exchange among states funded through a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Cooperative Agreement and to provide feedback on data products they developed in Year 2 of the agreement. States use the data to increase awareness about the link between oral health and diabetes within the diabetes community, and among primary care providers to improve health outcomes and potentially reduce costs of care for people with Type 2 diabetes.

The **Evidence-Based Preventive Dental Services CoP** focused on partnerships and collaborations for oral health programs that are providing evidence-based preventive dental services (EBPDS). Efforts addressed school-based sealant initiatives and data collection, as well as infection prevention and control for school-based dental sealant programs.



ASTDD COMMITTEES, COMMUNITIES OF PRACTICE, AND FOCUS AREAS

Other ASTDD Services Provided in 2025

Over the course of the year, ASTDD responded to the ongoing and evolving needs of members in a variety of other ways. For example:

- Our expertise in data collection and surveillance enabled us to provide 134 hours of TA for the BSS and other oral health surveillance issues to 12 states.
- For the new dental directors/program leads hired in 16 states in 2025, ASTDD provided one-on-one orientation calls and an invitation to our peer support/mentoring program. Participants could engage with a mentor and participate in peer discussion group calls.
- ASTDD also welcomed 110 new associate members and offered each a one-on-one call with our new associate member coordinator to guide them through our website, introduce ASTDD's resources, and recommend ways to get involved.
- With funding from the National Center on Health, Behavioral Health, and Safety, the Dental Hygienist Liaison (DHL) project supported dental hygienists from each state to help promote oral health among expectant parents and children enrolled in Head Start programs.
- Through the Consortium for Oral Health Systems Integration and Improvement, ASTDD supported the Network for Oral Health Integration (NOHI). Participating states strived to improve access to and utilization of comprehensive, high-quality oral health care for pregnant women, infants, and children at high risk for oral disease.
- ASTDD, in partnership with the American Association of Public Health Dentistry, hosted the 2025 National Oral Health Conference (NOHC) in Orlando, Florida, on April 7-9, 2025, with weekend workshops on April 5 and 6. Six hundred and fifty-eight individuals attended the event, considered "the premier meeting" for those interested in continuing education and networking

opportunities within the discipline of dental public health. The conference is designed for anyone interested in engaging in collaboration to improve the oral health of the public.

By connecting members with peers and proven resources, ASTDD helps state and territorial oral health programs build on shared lessons learned. Funders can partner with ASTDD to ensure we can continue to deliver this critical support and drive progress across the nation.

ASTDD FUNDERS AND PARTNERS

Strategic Partnerships

American Association of Public Health Dentistry (AAPHD)

For 26 years, ASTDD and AAPHD have co-hosted the NOHC, a multi-day event filled with continuing education and networking in the arena of dental public health.

American Dental Association (ADA)

ADA staff serve on several ASTDD committees, have presented on ASTDD Spotlight webinars, and assist by facilitating communication with their state associations. ASTDD has collaborated with the ADA on the annual Fluoridation Awards and participates in the National Fluoridation Advisory Committee (NFAC) of the ADA's Council on Advocacy for Access and Prevention.

American Dental Hygienists' Association (ADHA)

In partnership with ADHA, ASTDD recruits state dental hygienists for the Dental Hygienist Liaison Project offered by the National Center on Health, Behavioral Health and Safety. ASTDD provides ongoing TA and support for the volunteer dental hygienists who help promote oral health for pregnant women and children in Head Start.

American Fluoridation Society (AFS)

AFS collaborates with ASTDD through shared participation on the ASTDD Fluorides Committee and joint funding of Curate, a data-mining service that tracks fluoridation-related activity through local government documents such as meeting agendas and minutes.

Apple Tree Dental

Minnesota-based Apple Tree Dental served as the fiscal agent for the funding that ASTDD received from The Gary and Mary West Foundation for development of an Advocacy Guidebook for older adult oral health. Apple Tree Dental also assisted with writing the Guidebook and played a significant role on the ASTDD Healthy Aging Committee.

Association for Dental Safety (ADS)

ASTDD partners with ADS to provide infection control and safety TA to state and territorial oral health programs. ADS also contributes to ASTDD's Evidence-Based Preventive Dental Services CoP.

Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO)

ASTDD participates in monthly calls with ASTHO and its 19 affiliates to discuss and coordinate responses to ongoing federal funding and policy changes.

CareQuest Institute for Oral Health

CareQuest is a key partner in the redesign and expansion of the National Oral Health Data Portal.

ASTDD FUNDERS AND PARTNERS

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

Under a three-year cooperative agreement that began on September 1, 2024, CDC funding has supported two major components of ASTDD’s work:

- Component 1 funds national partner efforts to help states increase access to community water fluoridation and EBPDS such as sealants and fluoride varnish, while advancing health equity and systems change.
- Component 3 supports analysis and dissemination of secondary data related to medical-dental integration (especially among adults with type-2 diabetes) and EBPDS. It also includes evaluation of state activities related to fluoridation, EBPDS, and infection prevention and control.

Delta Dental Foundation of California and The Gary and Mary West Foundation

These funders supported development of an advocacy playbook. The playbook offers a structured framework with tools for educating advocates, crafting legislative asks, engaging stakeholders, and navigating policy windows using public value language.

National Association of Chronic Disease Directors (NACDD)

NACDD is an active partner in ASTDD’s Medical-Dental Integration CoP, particularly in efforts to raise awareness of the oral health-diabetes connection. It also facilitated connections with diabetes educators and state program leads to support coordinated care and communication.

National Maternal and Child Oral Health Resource Center (OHRC)

ASTDD partners with OHRC on two initiatives:

- The National Center on Health, Behavioral Health, and Safety (NCHBHS): ASTDD coordinates the Dental Hygienist Liaison Project.
- The Consortium for Oral Health Systems Integration and Improvement: ASTDD provides TA to professionals serving the maternal and child health population, supporting the integration of preventive oral health care into primary care. Funding also supported updates to two ASTDD resources: Best Practice Approach: Perinatal Oral Health and the Perinatal Oral Health Policy Statement.

National Network for Oral Health Access (NNOHA)

ASTDD, in partnership with NNOHA and AAPHD, released a Call to Action highlighting the urgent need and opportunity for the philanthropic community to invest in prevention, workforce, research, and systems-building as federal support for oral health is drastically reduced.

- Focus on core, high-impact, member-driven programs and activities that directly support state and territorial oral health programs
- Unveil a new logo, website, and refreshed visual identity to better tell ASTDD’s story

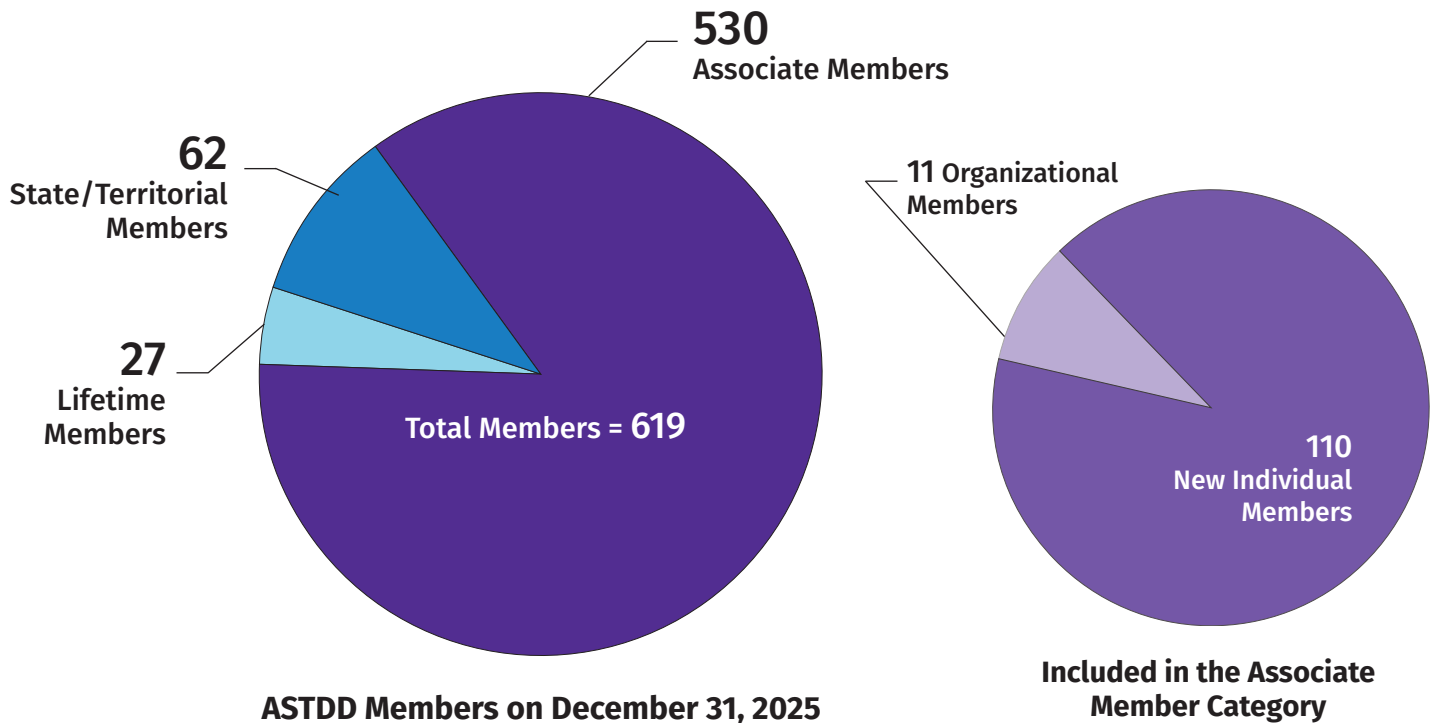


MEMBERSHIP

IN MEMORIAM: BEVERLY A. ISMAN

June 6, 1950 – March 16, 2026

In Loving Memory of Beverly Ann Isman, MPH, RDH

Beverly Ann Isman was a cherished colleague, mentor, and friend whose leadership helped shape ASTDD and the broader dental public health community for more than 25 years. Her wisdom, generosity, and unwavering commitment to improving oral health left an indelible mark on our Association and on countless people across the country.

A Leader in Dental Public Health

Bev earned a BS in Dental Hygiene in 1972 and an Masters in Public Health in 1976 from the University of Michigan, where she began her career at the Institute for the Study of Mental Retardation and Related Disabilities and in private dental practice. She went on to hold significant academic and public health roles, including faculty and leadership positions at the University of Colorado, the Maine Department of Human Services, and the Indian Health Service, where she supported tribes and clinics across multiple states and coordinated oral health promotion and disease prevention activities.

Bev brought the same rigor and compassion to her editorial and writing work, earning national certifications in scientific and medical writing and contributing to leading public health journals. She developed education curricula, led interdisciplinary teams, and advanced equity-focused approaches to care for older adults, people with disabilities, and other historically underserved communities.

Bev and ASTDD

Starting in 2000, Bev served as a self-employed consultant with ASTDD, focused primarily on grant writing and reporting, cooperative agreement management, and TA to states. Her relationship with ASTDD spanned more than 25 years, during which she served as:

- Longtime editor of ASTDD's *Roundup*
- Trusted mentor to many new dental directors
- A strong, engaged member and advisor across multiple projects and initiatives

Through her thoughtful policy guidance, clear writing, and generous mentoring, Bev helped shape ASTDD into the organization it is today. Her contributions were recognized many times over the years, including with the Greg McClure Memorial President's Award and other honors that reflected only a portion of her impact.

A Life of Curiosity, Travel, and Connection

Born on June 6, 1950, in New London, New Hampshire, Bev grew up on Star Island in Lake Sunapee, spending summers on the lake and winters in Florida, where her father worked

at Cypress Gardens. She was active in school and community life, participating in book clubs, music, sports, and leadership activities, and even serving as the Sunapee Bicentennial queen while working as a dental assistant.

Over the course of her life, Bev lived and worked in Michigan, Colorado, Maine, Oregon, and California, always combining her love of public health with a deep commitment to communities. With her husband, Dr. Robert (Bob) Isman, she traveled to more than 50 countries and islands, collecting stories, friendships, and art that filled their home in Davis, California. She remained closely connected to her hometown in New Hampshire and was devoted to her patients, colleagues, friends, and many beloved cats.

Bev passed away on March 16, 2026, with Bob at her side, after a courageous, three-year battle with pancreatic cancer. She faced her illness with the same grace, humor, and determination that characterized her life.

A Living Tribute

To honor Bev's life and legacy, the ASTDD Board of Directors has made a memorial gift through The Trees Remember, purchasing 100 trees to be planted in California. On behalf of the ASTDD Board, members, and consultants, this living tribute reflects Bev's legacy, leadership, caring spirit, and love for nature. May this gift grow and flourish as a reflection of the many ways Bev enriched the ASTDD community and the lives of those around her, and as a reminder that she will always remain rooted in ASTDD's history.
